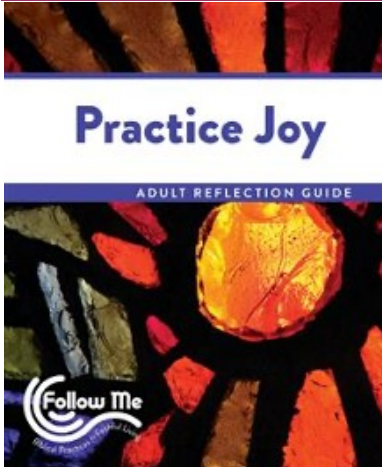




Pastor's Sunday Morning Group Moves to Wednesday Evening on Zoom *Practice Joy!*



The **Adult Sunday Morning Group** led by Pastor Peter will move to **Wednesday evenings: 7:30-9:00 pm** on **ZOOM** so more can participate! If Covid kept you home, if Sunday morning choir rehearsal prevented attendance, if it was too early to get up, or the time just wasn't a

good fit, Pastor Peter is moving the Sunday morning class to **Zoom Wednesday evenings** beginning the **first Wednesday of February!**

To brighten our almost two-year gloomy *pandemic outlook*, our **first topic** will be **Practice Joy**. Real **JOY** is something we all need. The study comes from the PC(USA) **Follow Me: Biblical Practices for Faithful Living** Curriculum and each member will receive a **Practice Joy** four-week *Adult Reflection Guide* to be picked up in advance of the start at the Church Office starting Sunday, January 30th. During the four Wednesdays of February, beginning Wednesday, February 2, we will: **Practice Joy**. As we approach the two-year mark of the Pandemic, we all can use some **JOY!**

We usually think of joy as a feeling, a response to something we experience. Scripture, however, invites us to experience joy as more than a passive response; instead, we practice joy as a faithful choice. Joy is something that we experience, something we savor, and something that is gifted to us by a loving and merciful God. While we experience joy individually, it is also a communal practice, one that is experienced in different ways by all God's people. Here are the weekly discussion topics featured in the *Adult Reflection Guide*:

- **Feb 2: See Joy in God's Creation (Psalm 65:5–13; Genesis 28:11–22)**
- **Feb 9: Rejoice in God's Mercy (Psalm 30; Luke 5:17–26)**

- **Feb 16: Share Others' Joy (Luke 15; Romans 12:15; 1 Corinthians 12:26)**
- **Feb 23: Practice Joy in All Times (John 16:1–24; Philippians 4:4–6)**

We will use the **Practice Joy** discussion to explore this faithful choice in greater detail together. Pick up an **Adult Reflection Guide** in the Church Office beginning Sunday, January 30, or during the week.

Looking ahead to **Lent**, a special six-week study **Practice Spiritual Disciplines** is planned. Also from the **Fellow Me** curriculum, it will be held **Wednesdays in Lent** on **ZOOM from 7:30-9:00 pm**. Make your Lent time preparing for **Holy Week** more meaningful through the discipline of spiritual practices! God's central invitation to followers of Jesus is to draw near to God in Christ and to allow God, through the Holy Spirit, to transform us into Christ's image. **Christian spiritual disciplines and spiritual practices** are ways in which we do that. Spiritual disciplines are usually thought of as those things that help us draw near to God and might include different forms of prayer, meditation, study, and service. See **JOY** Page 2

Spiritual practices are seen as those things Jesus did, said, or embodied; we as Jesus' followers try to do so as well. While dates will be finalized and printed in the March Courier, featured in the **Adult Reflection Guide** are the topics:

- **Fast** (Matthew 4:1–4, 6:16–18; Acts 13:2–3)
- **Pray** (Matthew 6:9–13; Philippians 1:3–11)
- **Listen to God** (1 Samuel 3:1–11; Mark 1:35–39)
- **Embrace Simplicity** (Matthew 6:19–21; Philippians 4:11–12)
- **Unplug** (Genesis 2:1–3; 6:30–34)
- **Try Different Practices** (Isaiah 43:19; Hebrews 4:15–16)

Many of the spiritual disciplines covered in this group discussion have emerged over the centuries as Christians have experimented with ways to make space in their lives to be with Jesus and to allow Jesus to transform them. As with **Practice Joy**, an **Adult Reflection Guide** will be available in the Church Office as we approach Lent.

In addition to the material in the **Adult Reflection Guide**, there will be also brief videos on Zoom Wednesday evenings as conversation starters. **Follow Me: Biblical Practices for Faithful Living** is a thirty-six-unit curriculum based on practices Jesus did and taught us to do as faithful followers. Written for people of all ages who wish to live out their faith, this new curriculum examines where these practices are found in the Bible and how they have been used in Christian faith then and now.

We hope you will participate in both group discussions and find some **Joy** and find time to **Practice Spiritual Disciplines!** —Pastor Peter



Transitional Ministry Update

You've read about the 7-week Seven Marks of a Vital Congregation bible study and discussion along with the Seven Marks Sermon Series that accompanied it last Spring. In October, the congregation was invited to participate in the U.S. Congregational Vitality Survey. The Transitional Ministry Mission Study Team is pleased to announce that the Mission Study report is complete and has been approved by the Session. The report summarizes information collected from the 7-week study, results of the survey, history of Carmel, and a current overview of how Carmel serves our community as reported on our website. We are currently awaiting a review of the report by the Presbyterian Commission on Ministry. Upon their approval, the team will distribute the report to the Pastor Nominating Committee for their use to find a new pastor that will meet Carmel's current and future needs and also to the congregation. We will schedule an opportunity to present our findings, facilitate discussion, and answer questions for the congregation.

The Transitional Ministry team has enjoyed this opportunity to seek out the voices of this congregation, review where we've been, explore how to build on our strengths, analyze areas for improvement and assist Carmel in spreading God's word and learning His will for how we can impact the world.

There is hope and excitement for Carmel's future. Now we just need to work together to discern the path forward. —Deb Gates

Ken Schuyler was elected Clerk of Session in 2022, replacing Nancy Pinkowicz who has faithfully served Carmel in this capacity since 2015 and will now be serving Carmel in 2022 as a member of the Pastor Nominating Committee. The following items were among the reports and business conducted by Session:

The Transitional Ministry Team's Mission Study Report was approved by Session at a special meeting on January 5th and must now go to the Presbytery's Commission on Ministry (COM) for approval. Once approved, it will be presented to the congregation for information. The Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) will hold our initial meeting after a Presbytery COM liaison is assigned, and will use the Mission Study Report as input as it starts the process of selecting a new Pastor.

The Personnel Committee is working on hiring a new Business Administrator to replace Mary Ann Welsh who is retiring. Thank you, Mary Ann!

As presented by Stewardship, Session approved four special offerings for 2022 – Souper Bowl, One Great Hour of Sharing, Peace and Global Mission, and Christmas Joy. Session approved the 2022 Operating Budget, which will be reviewed at the Annual Meeting of the Congregation on January 30th.

Due to the high number of COVID cases in recent weeks, Fellowship Hour will be suspended during January, and reevaluated for February. Session also decided to hold the Annual Meetings of the Congregation and Corporation virtually via Zoom, rather than in person on January 30, 2022.

From the Transitional Pastor's Study

What Is It We Make Manifest To the Community Around Carmel?

Dear Friends,

This year we have the **whole month of February** to journey from the **Season of Epiphany** (January 6: where Jesus' identity is made "manifest" to disciples and the world and disciples seek something new) to the **Season of Lent** that begins with **Ash Wednesday** (March 2: when disciples ponder and deepen their discipleship).

Most years Lent begins early to mid-February. What shall we do with all this **extra time**?

Early in Jesus' ministry Jesus says to the fishers Simon and Andrew (as they mend their nets): "Follow me and I will make you fish for people." Immediately, they leave their nets behind and follow. The same is true with James, son of Zebedee, and his brother John (they leave their father in the boat and follow).

Life is no different today—Jesus calls us.

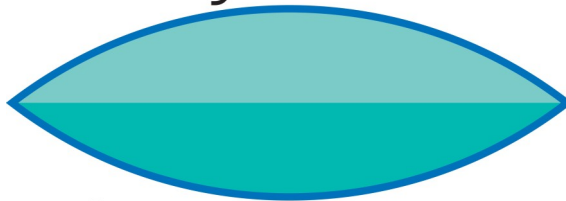
And, we have **all** of February this year to discover our calling (as God makes Jesus 'manifest' and we follow). We ask, what made these disciples leave behind their life and work for something new? What makes someone leave what they are doing to follow something totally new and as yet unknown? Jesus is the One who said, "Follow me!" I believe the answer is appropriating a **vision of something larger** than our daily lives.

The vision calls us.

We can sit at home and mend our nets—that's important. Yet, we also have a broader calling—to fish for people! **Carmel fishes in many ways**... through welcoming Spirit-inspired worship... through outward looking incarnational focused mission... through life-long discipleship formation with a focus on children to youth to young adult to older adult education... through Youth Ministries... through Fun Gatherings Where We Share Conviviality with Others... through caring relationships with each other and those we have yet to know... through intentional authentic evangelism as we witness among those in our community... and maintaining available hospitable buildings and grounds... To do and continue to do all of this we strive to live into empowering servant leadership.

Many of you were in the sanctuary (or participating virtually via livestreaming) as we ordained,

installed and recognized this year's class of elders, deacons and shepherds to be empowering servant leaders. At the sanctuary door, as folks departed worship, someone asked me, "Just what is ordination?" I gave a long and complicated answer, and then later looked it up to find a more concise way to respond. Here's what I

found:

The act by which the church sets apart leaders to serve in particular offices. The word ordination is derived from order. In ordination the church orders itself for ministry.

Many of us at Carmel have been ordained whether as an Elder or a Deacon and we know it's not just a "three-year job". As the saying goes, "Once an Elder/Deacon, always an Elder/Deacon." While elders and deacons may not be serving actively during a three-year term, the identity and responsibility—the calling—remains.

That is to say, of course, for **all** who are **disciples**—baptized and confirmed—into Carmel membership. This whole month of February, let us remember our baptisms and what it is we confirmed and/or affirmed as we became Carmel members. The Presbyterian Church *Book of Order* describes **faithful members** as those who accept Christ's call to be involved responsibly in the ministry of his Church. Such involvement includes:

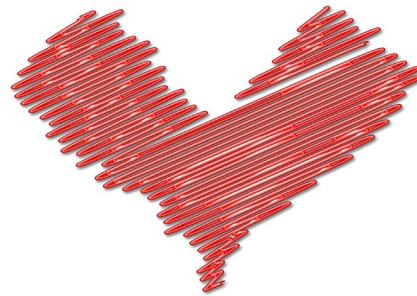
- proclaiming the good news,
- taking part in the common life and worship of a particular church,
- praying and studying Scripture and the faith of the Christian Church,
- supporting the work of the church through the giving of money, time, and talents,
- participating in the governing responsibilities of the church,
- demonstrating a new quality of life within and through the church,
- responding to God's activity in the world through service to others,
- living responsibly in the personal, family,

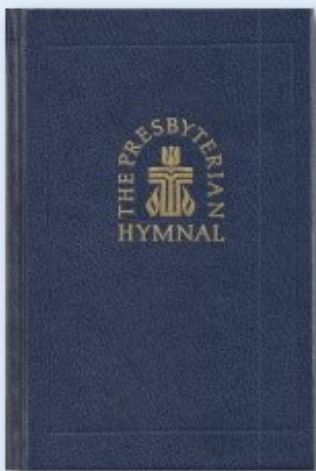

In *It's Okay Not to Be Okay*, Christian author Sheila Walsh looks at the all-encompassing love that Jesus expects of his followers. He commands us to “love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself” (Luke 10:27, ESV).

But we can't love that way without faith, Walsh writes. “I'm not living by faith if I have an answer to everything. If I understand everything God does or doesn't do, then all I need to love him with is my mind. We're called to love him with more.” That “more,” she explains, involves these paradoxes: “We love with all our heart, even when it's broken. We love with our soul, even when our humanity wrestles against our situation. We love with our strength, even when it's almost gone. We love with our mind, even when we don't understand.” Even if God's purposes and plans don't make sense here on earth, we can heed this advice from the great preacher Charles Spurgeon: “When we cannot trace [God's] hand, we must trust his heart.”
