Dear Northridge members and friends,

It's stewardship season at Northridge Presbyterian Church—the season when we focus intentionally on our finances. Unfortunately, I think stewardship season has been equated to the fundraising drives we experience at other organizations to which we give money. It's easy to think that stewardship season is the church version of what every other nonprofit does when they ask for money and you give. While it's true that we *are* asking for money, stewardship season is not about the church. It's a season of personal reflection where we ask ourselves how we're responding to God's grace in our lives. Stewardship is a spiritual practice. It helps cultivate our faith. The church needs money, yes, but the church doesn't need stewardship. *We need stewardship!*

When I think about the spiritual practice of stewardship, the most helpful instruction for me comes from Leviticus. In the Old Testament, the book of Leviticus includes specific instructions about how to harvest a field:

When you reap the harvest of your land, do not reap to the very edges of your field or gather the gleanings of your harvest. Leave them for the poor and for the foreigner residing among you. I am the LORD your God. (Lev. 23:22)

In response to this law, the Israelites began harvesting their perfectly square fields in a circular fashion, leaving the corners of the field untouched, not completely finishing the job. These instructions about how to harvest were intended to build generosity into the rhythm from the very beginning. The patterns of the fields were a visible reminder to the entire society that we're meant to give our harvest away from the very beginning instead of waiting to see what's left over.

I hope you'll accept this invitation to spend a month nurturing the spiritual practice of stewardship in your own life. Reflect on these ancient instructions. Sure, you may not have a field to harvest, but I've found it helpful to think of my budget as the field. How are you harvesting your field? Have you left the four corners of generosity?

Enclosed is a prayer card, and I hope you'll commit to praying this prayer daily. Pray this prayer each morning. Pray it each evening. Spend time reflecting on what God is teaching you through this practice of stewardship. Worship during the month of November will be a chance to continue this reflection on and cultivation of stewardship. Our sermon series is titled "In God We Trust," and together, we'll think about how our narratives of money have been shaped and what it means to say "in God we trust" when it comes to our budgets. I am confident that if we each commit to nurturing the spiritual practice of stewardship in our lives, our community will be enriched in ways we can't yet imagine.

As you pray each day, I hope you'll pray specifically for this community and for God's work among us. In the month of November, you'll hear stories of how God has worked through Northridge Presbyterian Church in the last year. Your stewardship enabled this work!

I look forward to journeying with you through this season. Enclosed is a pledge card. In worship on November 21, there will be an opportunity for you to physically present the enclosed pledge card as an act of worship, responding physically to God's grace in your life. If you've already submitted your pledge before then, we'll have a card that you can bring forward so you can still participate in this ritual.


