A SEASON

gentle reminder. Easter is a season - not just a single day. That seems important right now.

A day implies that it is a singular event and it is now over. But a season indicates a longer time for something to unfold.

After the resurrection on that singular day, it was essential for Jesus to spend important time with his peeps. It was time for him to help them understand what had happened and therefore what it would mean for them — especially what would be required of them eventually. Even though he had been teaching them for years about what would happen to him, it took the actual event for them be fully "woked up".

So he needed time for his community to believe this resurrected form really was Jesus, catch their breath and then understand its consequences for their future.

A season of time. So, Jesus spent time away with his team. Time to show, teach and help understand. Time to prepare them to be his voice and presence after he finally did leave.

Which got me to thinking.

This is our Easter season, too. We are already sequestered away practicing "Compassionate Distancing" to keep ourselves — but also others safe. It actually could be intriguing for us to spend time with Jesus, to muse about resurrection and to prepare for the day we can step back more fully into the world and once again be even more active on behalf of God.

Being kept away for the most part may give each of us some time to think about resurrection and what it means and why it matters — or even if we believe it.

Being kept away for the most part might give us time to contemplate what our God did for us on that singular day and why it matters a lot right now and in the future. Being kept away for the most part might also give us the chance to muse about what will happen when we can safely come out from locked doors — and what God might need us to do.

Resurrection is the foundation of our faith. It is the essence of what makes our faith perspective distinct. So how we see, understand, and embrace the God of this capacity is actually pretty important. Because Easter is a season, it helps us to know that understanding evolves. And as it evolves, so can our clarity and commitment to being "beacons of God's transforming light" in the world.

There will come a time when we will re-enter the world more fully. But right now we have a season which we can use to prepare for that re-entry. How will our faith help to shape the path we take — for ourselves personally but also for us as a faith community?

Which is getting me to think — and wonder — and hope — and pray. Join me.



A Virtual Choir is Born


It sounded pretty easy (for the singers, at least) when Ted Davis first suggested to the choir that we sing a "virtual hymn" as part of our Zoom broadcasts for Good Friday and Easter Day. The process seemed relatively straightforward: Make a video of yourself singing along with a video of Ted playing and singing the chosen hymn, then send it to Ted, and he would combine it with everyone else's video to make a composite "choir" version. A little choir karaoke.

So this shy, technologically challenged, obsessional perfectionist set about making a video. Let me say up front that I'm not in the habit of videotaping myself singing; some choir members are much more accustomed to video recording and do it with great competence and aplomb, but for me—and undoubtedly some others—it presented a series of interesting, and spiritually instructive, challenges.

Challenge #1 for me was finding the right equipment and using it properly. Let's see...I can play Ted's video on my desktop computer and record on my iphone. But, oh yeah, I have to wear headphones [memo: find headphones that work] while listening to Ted, tape the enlarged copy of the music to my screen so I can see it as I watch Ted on the computer and also look directly into the camera on my phone. And I need to sing the right notes, open my mouth wide [failed miserably at that!], shape the vowels the proper way, and erase all the Bal'morese, hon.

Oh, and I'd better make sure I don't stumble over any of the words, and I need to know my part well enough so that I can sing it correctly while Ted is playing in the background but singing another part. And I'd better not wear the hot pink scarf for the Good Friday

hymn (even though I'm recording on Tuesday), or the black sweater combo for the Easter hymn. And I've got to do something about my "headphone hair"!

At least for me, singing by myself felt very different than singing in person as part of a group: Gone were many of the visual and aural cues that a choral singer usually relies upon—the subtle movements of someone else's head, the conductor's correcting gestures, the reassurance and support of all the other voices making music with you. Ted gave us a lot of support in his video, even with both hands occupied at the piano, but there's a limit to how much even he could convey with eyebrows and a nodding head.

He did reassure us by pointing out that no one he knows, whether amateur or professional, likes watching videos of themselves making music. His advice: make the recording, and then send it off without listening to/looking at it (you won't be surprised that I couldn't do that!). From a spiritual perspective, audiotaping was a tremendously humbling—and salutary—experience for someone who has traditionally felt pretty confident about my ability to sing at least passably. But by the third or fourth "take," it was actually fun!

Then there was the matter of delivering my videos to Ted—the files were too big to email. Instead, Ted created a Dropbox account to receive our submissions. I had a bit of an advantage here, in that I'd used Dropbox occasionally, but I was still flying by the seat of my pants. Somehow, luckily, the files got through to him in time.

Finally, it was up to Maestro Ted to work his magic—to put everything together and make something beautiful out of our individual offerings. You can see his technical skill, musicality, and spirituality revealed—with the help of an editing program called DaVinci—in the final YouTube products at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=r-V2aqvtCPM and https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=y7W2BJAcVmc&feature=youtu.be.

Looking back on the experience, what strikes me most about this project is how heavily it depended on our having faith: faith in Ted, who yet again encouraged us to try something new and wonderful; faith that even our feeble individual offerings could contribute to our corporate worship at St. B's, giving glory to God and maybe even helping someone else to worship a bit more fully; faith in our fellow singers and their skill; and faith that God, in the power of the Resurrection, could work through Ted to transform our individual, imperfect offerings into one unified, joyous sound. Alleluia!

A Vestry Update

The current pandemic has brought many changes to our life at St. B's and the Vestry is no exception. The Vestry quickly switched gears and jumped on Zoom for Vestry meetings in March. They've had 3 meetings on Zoom and it is serving us well. They've been able to get lots of work done, discussions and decisions and staying in touch with each other. In addition to our normal meeting norms, the Vestry added a set of Zoom norms. For example, "Don't type during the meeting on your computer, it can be heard and is distracting" and "Don't chat with each other in the chat room — it acts as a side conversation."

Due to the coronavirus crisis, the Annual Meeting that would have been held on April 26, 2020 will be postponed until the fall. There is no way to hold a meeting in person or one on Zoom where everyone would be able to participate in questions and discussion and voting. One thing that happens at the Annual Meeting is that four Vestry members step down as their 3-year terms end and there is a parish vote on a new slate of Vestry nominees. These new Vestry members immediately step into their new roles if voted in at the meeting. Because the meeting is now postponed, the four Vestry members whose term would have ended on April 26 will stay on until the fall. This is fortuitous because it gives us continuity through this challenging time and keeps our seniormost members with us through the most impacted period. Happily they all agreed to stay on until the fall. We are most grateful.

Along with the delay in the Annual Meeting, the Vestry Retreat that takes place in May at Claggett is also postponed until the fall. Claggett is closed. We'll reschedule the retreat when the Vestry has the new members on board. Since Claggett doesn't have any available weekends in the fall 2020, it'll be scheduled elsewhere or at St. B's.

The Vestry has been very active since the pandemic began to impact St. B's. Along with their regular meetings, an additional special meeting was held in early April. They looked at the impact that the pandemic may have on our parish family, on possible sickness, job or work hours lost, and the possible effect on pledges and our ability to operate. We looked at the potential impact on the budget prepared by our Finance Committee Chairman, Michael Haynie — what costs may go down and which may increase. They also discussed the CARES Act loans to small business, nonprofits and churches, deciding to apply in order to cover any increased deficit in our income this year.

The Vestry started up a pastoral care phone tree to call all of our parishioners once a week to check in and uncover any needs. At this time, there are 22 people making phone calls. If you have not received a call yet and would like to, please let Corinne Bowmaker, the Senior Warden, know... zencorinne@hotmail.com. We are also checking to be sure people can attend the Zoom worship on Sundays.

The Vestry is working hard to keep St. B's looking and moving forward, being pro-active whenever possibl.... to keep St. B's operating and functioning even though worship and meetings are done in a new way. Though some ministries and activities are not currently active, they plan for the day when they all may be resumed and are working to put the parish in the best position to do this. They're also looking for ways to help our neighbors in the community along with 40 West and Hope Harbor during this time.

We may face a year of rolling openings and resumed quarantine throughout the country as conditions change. The Vestry is working to plan for this kind of eventuality and making contingency plans so that we can be ready for whatever comes.

In closing: May the Lord watch between me and thee, when we are absent, one from another, Amen!!



Happy Spring!

If you have any green space around your living area, weeding or planting can be a great stress relief.

If you have flowers you can cut, bring some inside to remind yourself it's Spring.

If you don't have green space, can you add a Pot to a door step or an inside sunny window? Herbs are easy to grow, as are marigolds and zinnias. Most grocery stores and hardware stores have those available, or you can order online from catalogs like Select Seeds, Burpee's or Botanical Interests.

If you love to weed but have a small yard, St. B's may be closed for church, but our landscape is there and flourishing.

I would recommend the buddy system since our campus is very large and our parking lot is empty.

But it is very simple to create distance and have an oasis to weed. I would like to suggest an old idea raised by the church garden team many years ago. We called it "adopt a plot."

If you divide our campus into plots to adopt and weed, it becomes more manageable and gives you the ability to reign in Mother Nature a bit and create natural distance.

So the front of the Church there are 2 sides of the main door, both with garden space.

Along the 2 sides of the churc are larger plantings that need pruning.

The Bishop's shade garden is a good respite in sunnier weather and the ivy needs to be kept in check.

The front bank will take at least a team of six and needs some heavy pruning. (Photo of front bank below, courtesy of Brigit Molony.) Note the <u>POISON IVY ALERT</u> for this area!

The Parish House has a large perimeter with plantings. I would suggest a team of at least 4 could work that area and Hey! — if you each take a side, natural distance is built-in.

There are at least 40 small trees that were intentionally planted as a tree nursery. Those need to be weeded at the trunk and then mulched. We will do our best to create a map of where those are, but a team of 5 or 6 could take this on with a wheel barrow or truck to cart the mulch from a pile we have at the back of our lot.

If you contact Celeste (jazzedupct@comcast.net) or John White (JFWhite58@gmail.com), we can help you find an area to work on, based on skill and agility.

We are considering having workdays where we would assign an area to you and give you instructions, if you are a beginner, on what is a weed and what is a plant.

We will show you how to identify poison ivy (which does love our campus) to keep us all safe. Our plan there is to have a bold spray paint color. If you see it, we spray it. Then someone less-prone to a reaction can pull it out with the bag-over-the-arm method.

So keep an eye out for a workday calendar from Celeste and John, and get out for a walk and admire the beauty of the earth, truly God's Creation.

- Accounting Expenses include payroll preparation expenses, audit expenses and bank fees.
- Insurance (Property/D&O) YTD reflects the sum of our quarterly payments for our policies.
- Office Expenses reflects the cost of copier rental, supplies, postage and computer support.

An Update from the Finance Committee

The finance committee would like to update the congregation on the financial health/status of our church and of the actions we have recommended to our vestry in the past weeks as a direct result of the pandemic which has firmly gripped our world.

The committee met earlier this month to look at the financial status of the church through March 2020:

- Year to date (through the end of March), the church is in good financial shape and actually ahead of our budgetary revenue projections.
 (Please see the treasurers report in this Apostle for the details of our financial statement.)
- Based on the pandemic and the inability for us to worship in person, as well as the potential financial impact of the pandemic on our congregants, we have begun to revise our Vestry approved budget projections on revenue. We have also looked at the church expenses, understanding there are many expenses because of the way we are worshiping which may or should be reduced.
- The committee also looked at external resources being offered as a result of the pandemic and if any would be applicable to our church.

The Finance Committee, based on those items above, made the following recommendations to our Vestry:

- To continue employing and paying all of our church personnel (we have eight employees of the church).
- To immediately cut non -essential spending by church committees since we were worshipping in a different manner and not at the physical space of the church.

- All church building utilities be carefully monitored and turned off when and where appropriate.
- The Church apply for the SBA (Small Business Administration) **Paycheck Protection Program** through our bank PNC.
- We revisit in late May/early June 2020 our financial status to see the condition of our income and the status of any funding programs we may have applied for.

The Vestry subsequently approved each of our recommendations in its special meeting on April 7th, 2020. Our treasurer, John Schroeder, with the assistance of our Bookkeeper, Kathy Schultheis, and Finance Committee member, Robin Murray, were successful in completing our application for the PPP. We are in the position of waiting for additional program funding from the federal government which should have occurred by the time you read this article.

On another note, it has been wonderful to see so many of you virtually!! I would also like to take this time to ask if you are in a position to honor your pledge or contribute to open plate, please do so. You can mail your pledge or gift into the church address or go up on our website and use the online giving link at https://www.acionlinegiving.com/2924. It will be imperative we have a good understanding of where we are financially in June so thoughtful decisions can be made of how we go forward. I would also suggest anyone experiencing hardships in keeping


Saying "Thank You!"

What's new at 40 West A & R? Oh, just everything!

Since shutting for the last two weeks of March, 40 West, its volunteers, and the board put together a new system of food delivery amid the pandemic. (You heard about that, right?) We now have a drive-through system to hand out food that prevents physical contact and maintains the six-foot social distancing requirement.

We have pre-screened volunteers through Maryland Food Bank who help with the outside food delivery so our regular volunteers aren't on the front line at this time. We have signs and flow charts, gloves and masks, and traffic cones. And it seems to be working, so far.

We still provide food to individuals without cars, but now that we've started the drive-through system the number of pedestrians has significantly decreased. Our goal is to provide outside food pick-ups weekly, but we're not there yet. In April we hope to have 3 food drive-throughs: 4/2, 4/16, and 4/28.

Many regular 40 West volunteers are wary of volunteering. This is understandable: our youngest volunteer is 65! Consequently, the Maryland Food Bank volunteers have been invaluable. Many parishioners and volunteers have helped. One volunteer sewed masks for us! Another volunteer directed traffic. We help where we can and pray we all remain healthy doing God's work as we look for God in the midst of it all.


