### RED SKY

There is an important adage among sailors: Red sky at night, sailors delight. Red sky in the morning, sailors take warning. It is important because it is actually generally true. There have been a couple of times when I noticed a pretty red sky in the morning, chose to not go sailing, and when a storm passed through was really glad for adage!

On the other hand, a pretty red sky at night is not only beautiful but has its own sense of calm.

So, there is a ferry that runs on Lake Champlain from the town of Essex, which is where I am, to Charlotte, Vermont. It is a blessing. Aside from the fun of traveling by ferry back and forth, it also makes the journey a lot easier and shorter.

The other night I managed to catch the last ferry of the day from Vermont. Phew. And as we pulled away, the sky was stunning. (So stunning that even the Captain came out to take a pic!)



So this stunning red sky overlooking the Adirondack Mountains was breath grabbing. But it was also soul grabbing. It so clearly embodied the presence of the divine — our massive creator who is a God so huge that it sometimes is just beyond our imagination. This sky, this exceptionally red sky, was captivating and calming. *Red sky at night*, *sailors delight*.

But it also turns out that this adage is not just a sailing thing. Farmers use it and I suspect lots of others do also.

Which got me to thinking about us — St B's.

It is easy right now (at least for me) to feel that the sky is redder in the morning — whether it literally is or not. The world just feels like "red morning skies" are the norm. That I am always looking at stormy times. It is exhausting and unsettling.

But then I look at St Bartholomew's Church and what do I see? Rich deep red evening skies. And my breath is grabbed.

We have choices spiritually. We can either live with the disconcerting image of morning red skies — or we can live with the power of massively red night skies. I know that storms are inevitable — however you define them. And I know that it is easy right now to feel the ever immanent presence of another storm.

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But I also know that the power of our God is very ever-present, our faith community (wherever we live) is strong and whole (not perfect but pretty awesome), and that we can choose to see God's outrageous red night skies if we look up. And in so doing, we can find some relief and calm as well as hope for a new day.

We are about to start a new program year. A new beginning. And yep, it is complicated by some significant stormy weather. But what I am sure of is that God is massively present casting red night skies

over us to call us to remain confident as we find ways to sail this year — to be God's holy people and to continue to do the ministry we have been called to do.

It will remain different, I suspect, for a while. But with the joy and assurance of **red night skies**, I trust we will find our path and navigate whatever lies ahead. Because our God is that huge! May your breath be grabbed by joy and hope and promise.

#### 40%, Nope, But

Rest assured, I spend lots of energy determining where and how we will worship. Of course that is actually true all the time - but it has been REALLY true since last March.

I am frequently awash in gratitude for the efforts of so many to help us find the sweet worship that we have been able to embrace at this time. AND I am awash in your collective participation, good humor, and perseverance as we remain a worshipping community — gathered, thanks to Zoom, from a lot of places around the country.

But I still wonder about gathering on-site for worship.

To that end, this summer the Wardens and I have continued to discuss if and when. To help in this effort, I have met with members of our parish who are skilled medical personnel and have knowledge about this virus. I have met with the Worship Committee. And it has been a topic for Vestry conversation as well.

For the immediate future we will not have on-site worship. All 3 groups have unanimously agreed that it is not worth the risk.

Here are my thoughts:

40% of all people with the virus are asymptomatic. That means they do not even know they are sick. Which also means that they could come to church unknowingly, not show a temp, and yet be a bearer of this disease. The best wisdom to protect and contain this virus is a mask and remaining distant. So we shall.

So Nope, no on-site worship for the moment. However, that can change because things regarding this virus can change. So we will continue to reassess. Promise.

But, we have found a path to sharing Holy Communion!

The agape meal is awesome. And it is kinda fun to think about sharing the meal that the earliest church would have had when they gathered — long before we developed our "Eucharist" meal. But I also know how central and important the sacrament of Holy Communion is. Soooooo we have figured out a way to be able to share that sort of meal as well.

Thanks to our Altar Guild leader, Gay Warshaw found a source for a small container that will have a piece of gluten free bread in the bottom and wine in the top: all sealed and in a plastic shaped chalice!

Ergo our first opportunity for this added dimension to our worship will be on September 20 when we celebrate St Bartholomew's Day.

Here is how it will work. On the previous Sunday, we will consecrate a lot of these small kits. Then the following Saturday, they will be on a table in the parking lot for you to come drive by and pick up what you need for you or your family — or even a neighbor who wants to join us. (The actual time and location to be announced so stay tuned.)

So that on the next day — Sunday the 20<sup>th</sup> — when we are gathered for worship, you can have consecrated bread and wine to consume. But we will also continue the Agape Meal.

A pretty nice chance to have a choice as we continue to be a faith community sharing worship and the gift of a meal — in whatever form you prefer or can manage.

Once we have this experience, we will figure out what's next.

So while it is 40%, Nope — it is also But. But what I do know is that we will continue to be blessed by God, continue to gather and worship and rejoice that we are an awesome group of Christians who delight in each other, who God delights in as well, and that we will remain thoughtful, safe and creative!

I will also send out a letter to you all with a fuller understanding of this decision. So keep an eye out.

In the meantime, here is another other worship note:

On Sunday, September 6, we will have our annual Back to School Blessing. No matter how or where you will be involved in school this year — if ever we should be blessing that endeavor — it is this year. So on that Sunday, all of you who are involved in any kind of school in any kind of way — have something that is a symbol of that effort with you (a pencil, a book, anything) and we will robustly offer a prayer for some awesome learning this year.

An intriguing year, but an awesome God and an amazing parish. Pretty sweet!

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### What Does Stewardship Look Like at St. B's?

In some ways, you'd never know that St. B's is in the midst of a pandemic. It's obvious that the church building sits quiet and empty, awaiting our eventual noisy and happy return. But our worship, ministries, meetings, and small groups continue and flourish. Much work is being accomplished in new ways. We're adapting and for the most part haven't slowed down much at all.

Our worship is live on Zoom and continues being uniquely "St. B's." Our coffee hour beforehand brings us together. We've had Sankofa groups meet on Zoom, choir chats, all kinds of committee meetings, and even a Community Conversation after the death of George Floyd that was attended by 150 people. From that conversation, action has sprung with new initiatives on a number of fronts involving different groups. The Gospel Justice Group has been busy with their planning for improving the relationship between our district's police force and the community. Outreach is working on voter registration. Adult Formation is planning a curriculum on Racism and Racial Justice with topics including Christianity and Racism, Black History in America, Black Achievements in Arts and Culture, Oral History and Personal Stories, and Racism as it Exists Today.

The Flea Market Committee did an amazing job of carefully planning how the Flea Market could safely be held this year and they are collecting goods to sort and sell. It'll take careful logistical planning but as most of the market will be outdoors and spread throughout the campus, it is workable.

Food drops and distributions are happening regularly outside in the parking lot. This continues to be an important ministry for the community. We have many volunteers who come to help us from the Maryland Food Bank and Mt. St. Joe's High School.

Landscape and Property Committees have also had their hands full and done a lot of work this summer. A dangerous tulip tree was removed from the courtyard area. Bamboo is being cut down to prevent it from engulfing the garage and our front bank has been trimmed back. The slate roof of the church was repaired and the leaky Tower Room roof underwent a full repair and overhaul. Toilets were replaced and bathrooms spruced up in the Parish House. The ceiling in the Parish House above the Faith Forum area started to cave in and it was rehung. Thanks, Dave Murray!

The Kid's Council is meeting to plan Sunday School in the fall as it will move to a virtual platform. It's a big transition. The Youth have been meeting on Zoom throughout the summer.

Jigsaw has been quiet for a few months as we regrouped and dealt with the immediate matters of worship, checking on each other, and moving everything onto Zoom. But it will be gearing up this fall and you will see movement forward!

So.....these activities mentioned are but a part of what is going on and reflect a vibrant church. We thank you for keeping up your pledges through this "coronatide" as work progresses and we continue to maintain our buildings and grounds. Unfortunately, the bills don't stop. Some parishioners have moved to on-line pledging to make it easier. You can access how to do that on our website and if you have any questions, you can contact our Assistant Treasurer, John DeVale. Thank you for understanding the need for pledges to continue as you are able as we navigate this pandemic time, yet are also undertaking exciting new initiatives!

We had 3 trees removed — a hollow tulip poplar that was in the court yard, a dead one at the back of our lot, and one that came down in a thunderstorm into the Youth House back yard. \*\*\*

John and Dave have worked tirelessly to assess the grounds and do major maintenance on anything that had become a safety issue. So if someone could hide,

if it obstructed a walkway or entrance, or if it was old and could fall, they have been pruning hard while you have been away — you will notice the difference!

Wildlife is loving the extra space — many bunnies, squirrels, deer, and the occasional fox wander by.

We have high hopes of transplanting items in the fall to add color and beauty to areas in need. We look ahead to fall to add clean-up days where Celeste and John will create distanced jobs for each area.

\*\*\* So fun fact in the State of MD — If you don't let your neighbor know and put something in writing that a tree on their property looks like it will hit your property, when the tree falls it is your insurance and deductible that covers the accident.

So folks, take a look around your homes — does your neighbor have any ivy-covered trees, or older split trunk trees, or trees that lean toward your home? We know the numbers of many arborists that could come take a look. It may be time to assess trees and get a letter prepared.

#### Racism, Policing, and the Gospels

o the Gospels speak to the issue of racism in our society?

YES! Absolutely!

In Matthew 22, Jesus is asked by the Pharisees which is the greatest commandment. Jesus answers famously: "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like unto it, Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets." [KJV Verses 37-40]

What does it mean to love your neighbor as yourself, and how can that possibly be as important to Christians as loving God??? Who is your neighbor? And can't we love some of our neighbors less than others?!!!

The Gospels make this crystal clear. Jesus calls upon us to love those around us completely and wholeheartedly, regardless of whether or not they look like us. Incidentally, this passage was a subtle dig at the Pharisees: that Jews needed to love non-Jews as much as they loved each other. At the time this was a radical statement, and it is no less radical today.

The Gospel Justice Group (GJG) was established by Flo in 2018, bringing together a group of parishioners who wanted to explore how the Gospels can help guide our Christian response to divisive issues in our parish and our community. The current membership of the GJG includes Daphne Cover, Charles Flexner (Co-Chair), Amanda Harris (Co-Chair), Tramar Murdock Jennings, Willis Keeling, Heather Neil, Dana Rose, and Michael Sarbanes.

The initial focus of the GJG has been race and racism, and what we can do about racism as followers of Christ. In response to the death of George Floyd, we were asked to consider what we could do to help the parish and surrounding community work through the

troubling and long-standing issues of racism, racial profiling, and violence in community policing practices. A tall order indeed.

So how are we approaching this? With a 3-step process of Discernment, Engagement, and (ultimately) Reconciliation.

<u>Discernment</u> in this case means trying to educate ourselves about past and present relations between our community and our Southwest Police District, as well as what is known about the roots of racism in local and national policing practices. We are also collecting educational resources that might be of benefit to parishioners wishing to learn more about these issues, and what they can do to help (stay tuned). We are fortunate in this regard to have access to parishioners Patricia Smith, a retired member of the BCPD, and T.J. Crews, a newly-minted Baltimore County Police Officer based at Woodlawn, who have met with our group and provided insight into what is happening from the law enforcement perspective.

Engagement means reaching out to local police, including Southwest District Community Relations personnel, as well as our former (Helen Holton) and current (Kristerfer Burnett) City Council Representatives. And two of us – Amanda and Tramar – visited the SW District on a recent Saturday, taking cookies to share with the officers on duty and listening to their stories! In the near future, engagement will include the Route 40 Ministerium and local churches.

<u>Reconciliation</u> implies that a relationship has been ruptured and is in need of repair. We know that to be the case. Parishioners and many members of our community are disheartened and living in fear. On the other side, we have heard that police morale in Baltimore is at an all-time low. What can we do as Christians to help bring these groups together?

We believe that neighbors engaging with neighbors is the best way to understand each other and begin to heal this rift. Plans include inviting officers from the SW District to meet with groups of St. B's parishioners, and to engage local police — especially younger and newer members of the force.

Discernment, Engagement, and Reconciliation. This is a process that will require all of us working together. Most importantly, this is a process that will require us to love one another as we love ourselves. This is not only the right thing to do, it is what the Gospels command us to do!

The GJG invites all St. B's parishioners to be a part of this process. We are happy to field questions and exchange ideas, so please contact a member of the GJG if you want to know more, or have additional suggestions for resources that we can share.

### Moving Along During the Pandemic of 2020 (If We Build It, They Will Come)

othing prepared me for the generous outpouring of energy and camaraderie that make up 40 West's weekly food distributions. In March and April, confronted with the dire news of the COVID-19 pandemic, the leadership team of 40 West had no idea how we would provide food to our clientele. Where would we find sufficient willing and able volunteers to provide outside food distributions?

Then the Maryland Food Bank announced they could provide us and other food sites the volunteers we needed. This enabled 40 West to re-open with an outside food distribution model in mid-April. We now have provided weekly food distributions from April through July. We hope to extend the outdoor food distributions from August through October.

In all, we have held 16 food distributions (16 days) where we provided 60,804 pounds of food from April 2 through July 28. This food reached 1,983 households with a total of 5,498 people. It equaled 50,670 meals. During this same period in 2019, we provided 44,703 pounds of food to 1,591 households over 50 days. This equaled 37, 204 meals.

During April through July 2020, we were awarded \$14,750 for food purchases to feed individuals during the pandemic from the Department of Human Services COVID-19 grant. (This includes \$7,142.00 for the month of August.) We also applied for and received \$15,000 for food purchases specifically for seniors age 60 and over who live in Baltimore City. We have also been awarded two \$500 Giant gift cards from the Maryland Food Bank for food purchases during the pandemic.

We applied for and were found eligible for \$2,000 from the Maryland Food Emergency Program to purchase food. (This is a grant not specific to COVID -19.) We received 3,643 pounds of food from the St. B's Outreach Committee food drives held in May and July, as well as additional individual donations throughout the summer. The Open Church of Maryland provided 807 pounds of unique items for the Senior Food distributions that we were unable to obtain from the Maryland Food Bank.

A non-monetary invaluable contribution organized through the Maryland Food Bank has been ten volunteers each week to help us with the food distributions. Four students from Mount Saint Joe's have also helped with the heavy lifting from June forward. Numerous individuals from St. B's and other nearby churches have consistently helped us provide weekly food distributions throughout the spring and summer.

The 40 West Board is now looking at the feasibility of *safely* opening 40 West this November to be able to serve individuals in need of financial assistance for rent, utilities, and food. We are in the beginning of researching this possibility. We will let you know if and how we will do this when we have figured out the way forward. This is a big step. Please keep us in your prayers for wisdom and guidance. Thank you, community of St. Bartholomew Episcopal Church, for your generous and continued support.


