A SHADOW

n our daily walk this summer, I looked down and noticed Brook's and my shadows.



I thought hers was delightful and sweet. Mine more like the Fee Fi Fo Fum variety. Kinda unnerving to be honest.

But it did get me to thinking about how shadows are often bigger and more formidable than we normally appear. I think that is pretty cool (except for the feefi-fo-fum part). Imagine if we think of ourselves as bigger than we are. That we can cast our presence farther than we think. That we are not always limited by our actual size and stature. Which got me to thinking about how do we cast our shadows as children of God.

I do think that God hopes we will understand that we are capable of being bigger than we think, of being more present than we assume and more out there than we consider. I think God expects us to think beyond our limitations and to see bigger opportunities and to stretch to make them happen.

So how do you allow yourself to be bigger than you assume? How do you think about being and doing things that stretch you beyond your perceived or assumed limitations? How far will you let your shadow be cast?

Today's world needs our determination to stretch beyond our limits, to be a bigger presence so we can bring the Word of God and her presence into a world so sadly in need of it. The world is enough of a mess at the moment that our shadow capacity is really needed. The world needs our compassion but also our clarity about what is just and in accordance with the God of our faith and trust. There are a ton of opportunities even if we are limited and restricted

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thanks to a virus. Because the chance to do something awesome is also right out there if we just stretch ourselves in new and amazing ways.

So how do we cast our shadow beyond our limits? Only if the Son is behind us. Literally. (*That is not a misspelling btw of sun!*)

I cannot stretch myself without knowing that Jesus is behind me. Jesus is the one who can make my shadow

as big as possible. And I know that our shadow as a parish can be amazingly huge if we cast together.

So I hope you will think about the Son behind you, think of a direction to cast your shadow, invite others to join you — and then actually creatively do it! Imagine the stories we will share.


The Blessing of the Animals

Taking Care of Diocesan Business

The 236th Convention of The Diocese of Maryland met on Saturday, September 12.

This year's convention had a different feel. It was the first Zoom convention, with a quorum of 21 in attendance at the Diocese of Maryland on University Parkway in Baltimore. From the moment I walked into the building I felt that this would be a historic gathering.

The convention's original date was pushed into the fall because of a deadly sickness that has taken over 200,000 lives in this country, requiring all of us to 'meet' in separate rooms, and changed the 'face' of our country by requiring distance and masks wherever we go.

The convention also was only one day this year, which required more focus as the nominations for offices were done prior to the convention date with voting on the resolutions done during the convention.

I was directed to an office on the second floor where I set up my computer, closed the door, and waited...alone. The sign of the times, missing the

large, round table where we sat last year at the Turf Valley Convention Center, members of at least four different congregations, enjoying each other.

Morning prayer started at 9:00 am, and a powerful sermon about the power of 2020 Vision was delivered by The Right Reverend Robert W. Ihloff. Bishop Sutton's address followed with his topic "Lamentations."

Voting on several resolutions followed, led by The Reverend Eddie Blue, the chairman of the Resolution Committee, including pay, sabbatical leave, revision to Canon 1-400 (reducing the number of Diocesan Council meetings to four per year), moving the Convention to the Fall, a resolution on anti-Semitism and Palestinian Christians, and the Resolution on Reparations. All resolutions were passed.

I wish to thank the Convention organizers for their efforts in keeping us safe during these unprecedented times.

Thanks to the recession, I ended up losing my first job out of college and decided to spend some time visiting my grandmother and family in Panama, the country where my parents are from. As we always say, we make plans and God just laughs because I had all intentions of visiting Panama for a month or two but somehow two months turned into 2 and half years. I went from volunteer at a bilingual school to becoming full time English as a Second Language (ESL) teacher at St. Francis of Assisi Episcopal School. Making a difference in a child's life was extremely rewarding and I thoroughly enjoyed that experience. I taught third, fourth, and fifth grade- moving up each year with my students. I also had the opportunity to learn more about my Panamanian culture and background and became fluent in Spanish.

I grew up in a Catholic home but living in Panama I was able to attend an Episcopal church before accepting the teaching position. I was instantly greeted with hospitality and loved the overall organization of their Vestries. I knew then this was where I belonged. Upon returning to the states, I found an Episcopal church back in Waldorf - St. Paul's Episcopal. I was later reconfirmed as an Episcopalian by the Bishop Marianne Budde at the Washington National Cathedral in DC.

A few years later I moved to Ellicott City to be closer to my job located in downtown Baltimore. I drove past St. B's to and from work and finally in the early part of 2017, I decided to stop in and attend a 10:30am Sunday service. hospitality and infectious smile still stand true today. It was not long after that I knew I found a new church home. I became more involved as a reader and an acolyte.

When I first started attending St. B's, I worked for Share Our Strength, No Kid Hungry where I served as the Maryland Program Manager and oversaw meetings with superintendents, teachers, and nutrition directors to expand federally funded nutrition programs to at-risk kids. During this time, I collaborated with the Let's Move! While the job was challenging, I knew I was no longer fulfilled and was ready for a career change that concentrated on people instead of being burdened by red tape and the bureaucratic confines that often come with working at nonprofits and corporate companies.

I decided to pursue a career in hospitality and at the end of 2019, I began working at the MGM Hotel and Casino in National Harbor as a Marketing Executive Casino Host. Unfortunately, my tenure was short lived thanks to Covid19. Currently, I work part time as the Executive Director for the Maryland Association of Student Councils. It is an organization that works with school student government associations to make sure that students' voices are elevated on the local and state level.

If 2020 has taught us anything, it is that we can make all the plans in the world, but only God's plans are the ones that come into fruition. Because of the restrictions and closures caused by the pandemic, many of us, me included, have been given more time than before. For me, I have taken this time to pause and reflect, primarily on the many blessings God has given to me. Despite all the craziness, I am grateful for my health, my family, and my church family at St. B's. I am grateful to have this opportunity to serve in a greater capacity and join the lovely members of the Vestry.

Fall Session of Sankofa Circles — Coming Soon!





A Thank You from the Catonsville Senior Center

This past August, the Catonsville Senior Center (CSC) put out a request for donations of yarn to support their Community Project, Project Linus. Project Linus is a national nonprofit organization with

local chapters in many states that

collect and deliver new blankets to children who are sick or traumatized.

St. Bartholomew's was able to answer the call. Two shopping bags of yarn, from the supply of donated yarn stored for use by our own Sewing Bees and Prayer Shawl groups, was delivered to the CSC.

Members of the Catonsville Senior Center crochet blankets, scarves, stuffed toys, baby hats, and shawls to donate. Many items go to St. Agnes Hospital, where they are disinfected and stored for use with patients. Prayer shawls are distributed to several churches in the area, where they are blessed and distributed to those in need. The crochet group at the CSC had experienced a shortage of supplies, as the COVID-19 restrictions have impacted their ability to be together and to obtain donations, but not their desire to serve.

Fire, COVID-19, and Life at St. B's

T wo nights ago we camped at Lava Beds National Monument in northeastern California, arriving well into dusk. It's an austere place of mostly volcanic rock piles and lava caves, with some occasional pockets of soil hosting juniper trees, sagebrush, and autumn-dry wild grasses. Upon arising the next morning, we were astonished to find that a major fire just six weeks before had burned 70% of the Monument. All the grasses and brush were gone, and most of the junipers had fire-blackened trunks and withered grey leaves. It was a vision out of T. S. Eliot's "The Wasteland." Would this fragile but austere landscape ever recover? Would life ever return in the abundance and diversity it once had?

Which got me to thinking

Our current COVID-19 situation is in some ways similar to conditions at Lava Beds. Without the advantages of in-person church each Sunday, I find maintaining a sense of community is difficult, even with Zoom church. I so look forward to that joyous day when we can all be together, in person, worshipping God in our beloved sanctuary. But when that day happens, I know our community will be different, in ways we cannot now predict.

Back at Lava Beds, the 2021 growing season will bring renewal, with green grasses rising, new growth on the surviving junipers, fresh buds on the rabbitbrush and sage. Birds will return to nest, and deer to graze, carrying seeds on their feathers and fur. Humans will be helping too, planting thousands of seedling trees. Resurrection of life in a devastated landscape will be like a miracle.

And so it is with our congregation. We will need new members to replace losses, to provide new energy, to do new mission, and to carry the message of Jesus to a recovering neighborhood, and world.

We can get started on that process today. Invite a friend to Zoom church (or to in-person church, when it resumes). Even if you've invited someone before, life is different now during and after COVID-19 — a gentle inquiry might be in order. Or, put out the good word on your favorite social media platform; those methods of communication are more widely used than ever before. Publicize what we are still doing in spite of COVID-19: we worship together every Sunday; we volunteer with and support 40 West A&R, Hope Harbor, My Brother's Keeper, Cease Fire Baltimore, KIVA, ... the list goes on. Helping with an attractive mission can be a gateway to faith and church attendance.

Just like at Lava Beds, renewal, redemption, resurrection, and re-creation at St. B's <u>will</u> take place, during and after COVID-19. It's just that God needs an assist from us to make it happen sooner. So be that blazing beacon of God's transforming love in the world — invite a friend!



If you - or someone you know - would like to talk about anything related to the 2020 election, please join us!



VOTING SAFELY IN THE BALTIMORE AREA: Tips for 2020 – PART 2

Be sure you're registered! The deadline to register is <u>October 13, 2020.</u> Register online at the State Board of Elections: <u>https://voterservices.elections.maryland.gov</u>

Mail-In Ballots:

- ⇒ YOU WILL NOT AUTOMATICALLY RECEIVE A MAIL-IN BALLOT UNLESS YOU REQUEST ONE. All registered voters should already have received by mail, a form that allows you to request a mail-in ballot. You can use this written request, or request online at the address above. Requests for mail-in ballots must be received by the Board of Elections by October 20th.
- ⇒ Be sure your ballot gets returned and counted! The best method for returning your completed ballot is to drop it in a designated drop box before election day. A list of the drop box locations will come with your ballot. You can also mail it by US Postal Service any time before election day, though the postmark must be no later than 8:00 pm Nov. 3rd.

Voting In-Person:

- ⇒ Early voting begins October 26th and ends November 2nd. Check the Board of Elections website (above) to learn where the early voting centers are, and where you can vote, depending on your address.
- \Rightarrow Election Day is November 3rd, 2020.
- \Rightarrow If you vote in person, either during early voting or on Election Day:
 - Not all usual polling places will be open. Check the Board of Elections website to verify where you should vote.
 - Be sure to wear a face covering, including over your nose.
 - Maintain at least 6 feet distance between you and others.
 - Try to arrive early. Be prepared for longer wait times.

No matter which candidates you support, remember that voting is our right, our privilege, and our responsibility. Democracy works if we all participate!


