

# An Annual Meeting — on Zoom!

St. Bartholomew's held its Annual Meeting on April 18, 2021 via the technological gift of Zoom. Angel Jackson, our dedicated Senior Warden, facilitated the meeting. An estimated 90 people joined the meeting.

All members of St. B's who were remotely attending on computer or tablet were able to participate in a vote to approve minutes of the 2019 Annual Meeting and the 2020 Annual Report, which had been emailed to members for their review prior to the meeting. Both items were approved unanimously. This virtual vote is considered an official record. (Regrettably, the technology did not allow those attending by phone to participate in the voting.)

In his role as Chair of the Finance Committee, Michael Haynie presented a financial report that included an end of 2020 fiscal summary, and a brief review of the 2021 budget previously approved by the Vestry.

Deirdre McElroy, as outgoing chair of the Funds Committee, provided an overview of the funds over the year, which overall showed strong growth. The congregation expressed profound thanks to Deirdre, and outgoing Funds Committee member Sandy Woodcock for their wise stewardship. The congregation also welcomed new Funds Committee members Henri Oliveros and Bonnie Kutch.

Dave Murray provided an update on Project Jigsaw. With a challenge grant from the Knott Foundation in hand, work is scheduled to begin soon in the undercroft to abate asbestos and address longstanding drainage issues. Dave thanked the over 45 congregation members who have helped over the past few weekends to clear the undercroft and church offices in preparation for this work. Another major workday is scheduled for April 24 to move all of 40 West into the Parish House. The undercroft and office areas will be off limits while the asbestos removal is underway. Dave indicated that these improvements when completed should give use the

best air quality we have had in the Undercroft. He also reported that these measures will provide significant savings down the road in the ultimate price tag of Project Jigsaw. The chat was replete with profuse thanks from congregation members to Dave for so ably coordinating this complicated process.

Rev. Flo reviewed the current status of thinking about Onsite Plans for worship. She described three different governance structures that we are paying attention to: The State of Maryland, City of Baltimore, and Diocese of Maryland. Currently, Baltimore is experiencing a spike in cases. St. Bartholomew's also consults exceptional expertise that exists within the congregation including Rev. Ann Boyd (virologist) and Dr. Charles Flexner (immune disease expert at Johns Hopkins). Rev. Flo emphasized that this is a matter of constant attention and prayer for her, the Wardens, and the Vestry, with the goal to come back in person as quickly as is consistent with evolving health guidelines. An informal voluntary poll was conducted to see which parishioners have had at least one vaccine and it appeared that the large majority of those in attendance had at least begun the vaccination process.

She indicated that the next step under consideration is an in-person 8:00 am service outdoors, similarly to how we did the Easter "sunrise" service. The 10:00 service would continue to be online for the near future. She also indicated that when we do ultimately come back to fully in-person services, it would be important to consider how to offer the opportunity for people to worship from far away, as many have begun to do during the pandemic.

The congregation also offered a large round of applause to outgoing Vestry members: Stephanie Brooks-Wiggins, Verna Harrison, Michael Mountain, Ben Smith, and Tim Wolf. We are inexpressibly grateful for their service and wisdom on behalf of the congregation!



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## News from Creation Caretakers

### **Good News!**

As reported in a previous "What's Happening," Easter has come to the Patapsco River: According to Dan Rodricks' commentary published on Good Friday, April 2, 2021 in the *Baltimore Sun*, biologists have found silver alewives and river herring swimming upstream from the dismantled Bloede Dam! These small fish provide food for bass, cod, seals, and osprey, as well as other big fish, mammals, and birds. A relic from the historical mill industry, dams once provided power to the mills, but also cut off access to spawning grounds for fish, thus decimating their populations and upsetting the Chesapeake Bay's food chain. **Hallelujah to the River's Resurrection!** 

### Recommendation: Landscape with Native Plants

Consider planting native plants in your garden. You can buy them locally from Herring Run Nursery, a Blue Water Baltimore program. Since natives have co-evolved with native insects, they provide food for baby birds and pollinators, such as bees and butterflies, and they are easy to grow because they come from here. Attractive native flowers include Eastern columbine, black-eyed Susan, butterfly weed, and cardinal flower; attractive shrubs and trees include summersweet, beauty bush, service berry (shadbush), dogwood, redbud, and chokecherry. # Property Updates

Plans are being made to have all asbestos removed from the undercroft and a new drainage system installed around the perimeter of the lower level during the May10 to June 30, 2021 timeframe. To accommodate this work, the entire undercroft must be vacated. So, on Saturday, April 10, 39 folks showed up to help move the staff offices and Hope Harbor office to the garage and Youth House. It was quite an effort and everyone seemed to have fun. (Please see the photos below and on pages 18-19).

Additional thanks to everyone coming to help move the entire 40 West Operation over into the Parish House on Saturday, April 24.

This work is partially funded via a Challenge Grant of \$15,000 from the Knott Foundation. The rest of the work will be paid via Project Jigsaw funds transferred to the 40 West account. With this funding in place, 40 West can count the cost of this work towards their State of Maryland Matching Grants that were secured in 2018/19 for JIGSAW. Both the asbestos removal and the drainage system were part of the JIGSAW project.

On another note - The Church sewer line still needs to be fixed. So far, the City has located their manhole near the rear of the garage and we're working with Abbott's Plumbing on a fix that hopefully ties the Church into the Parish House sewer line, which then drains to the City sewer.



# "Bmore2gether" with KIVA

The KIVA group met in January after a lengthy break due to COVID-19 and chose 4 individuals/groups to lend to. Unfortunately, due to complications, the funding did not make it to those groups. We met again on April 7 to choose new groups to provide our outreach. We meet bi-monthly to designate funds for microloans lent to a wide variety of people and countries. This month we loaned to the following folks:



'Oto'ota from Patangata, Tonga. She and her husband run a fishing business but they hire a fishing boat. She applied for a loan of \$2625 to purchase a new fishing boat so that her husband will freely use it for their business and they can also rent it out. 'Oto'ota sorts and packs the fish and other seafood that her husband catches into plastic bags and sells it at the local fish market.

Nuvia from San Gabriel, Ecuador is a 41-year-old mother of two older boys who live in a borrowed house. Her children are studying in secondary school and university. She works raising and selling cattle and requested a loan of which we contributed \$1375 to finance the purchase a pair of young bulls. She will raise them for a few months before selling them and will continue rotating and selling to get earnings with which she can provide her children with what is needed.





Norcafé Peru is a coffee cooperative sourcing high quality "green" coffee from nearly 500 smallholder farmers in the Andes and Amazon regions. They have asked for a total loan of \$50,000 which we decided to contribute \$6,000 towards. This loan will help to provide higher incomes and cultivation training to coffee farmers. They are UTZ certified which includes "no deforestation of primary forests" and "protection of ecological diversity" as part of it's requirements. They have scored an 8.86 out of 10 in the 2019 Forest Landscape Integrity Index which is the 15th best score in the world. That means that 88% of their forest is intact (compared to Germany's forest only being 22% intact).

So stay tuned. Pretty exciting mission.



# Hope Harbor: A Year of Re-Examination

ope Harbor was established in 2010 and has L served partner families in their journey toward self-sufficiency since 2013. The past year has been complicated and has resulted in discernment and recalibration. We began 2020 with four new board members from diverse backgrounds and were awaiting the recommendations of a task force that had been directed to consider restructuring options. Our staff worked hard to maintain contact and continuity with our partners amid the restrictions posed by the pandemic. This was very challenging. Based on this, the Board decided that the activities of Hope Harbor would be in a "holding pattern": we would refrain from taking new partners and volunteers and streamline fundraising events at this time. However, the board also decided to use this time to explore possible partnership opportunities with organizations that have compatible missions. This outreach process is ongoing, with an "exploratory committee" established for this specific purpose.

There have been changes on the board and staff. Completing their three-year board terms this past January were Treasurer Geoff Martiny and Nancy Nicaise. Their contributions were greatly appreciated and will be missed! Stepping into the Treasurer position is the very capable David McClellan. Staff member Sheila Drummond, who provided direct service to families, resigned at the end of 2020.

Following Sheila's resignation, Anna Williams, Director of Resource Development and Program, assumed dual responsibilities as the Family Outreach Worker in addition to her ongoing position. Anna recently announced that she will be retiring from Hope Harbor in April. She has been with Hope Harbor since its inception, serving as the first Family Outreach Worker in 2013. Anna's dedication to Hope Harbor has been a steadying, vital force throughout the course of our journey. We are now serving six families. Plans are underway to fill this position and provide continuity for our partners.

Fundraising events were scaled back but, in partnership with 40 West, a successful drive-through crab feast was held. We also enjoyed virtual bingo earlier this year. Through a grant from the Catonsville Women's Giving Circle, we are sponsoring workshops tailored to partners' service goals and interests of the larger community. In March, a workshop on the Power of Play was presented by a local play therapist. Three other workshops will be scheduled this year. Please stay tuned for announcements of these workshops. We greatly appreciate the support of the St. B's community and welcome your participation!


