

Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world." When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself. When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.

- Seasonal (Christmas, Halloween, etc.)
- Plants and Garden Items (plants, seeds, vases, planters, small garden tools, etc.)
- Sporting goods (bats, balls, tennis racquets, etc.)
- Pet Items (carriers, beds, bowls, cages, etc.)

We'll give you a donation receipt for your tax purposes. You can just drive up and drop off – we'll take care of the rest. Look for the table in the parking lot near the red back door.

Please note: St. B's really want things we can resell; items that are broken, stained, or in need of pieces or repair can't be sold so please check items before donating.

What CAN'T St. B's take? Here is a quick rundown:

<u>FURNITURE</u> – no matter how good it is, no matter whether it is upholstered or not, no matter what size, <u>we have no place to store it</u>; we're sorry – please try a charity like Salvation Army, Goodwill, Habitat for Humanity, etc., or try a local Facebook Buy Nothing group, Freecycle, or CraigsList – Free Stuff.

<u>BIG EXERCISE EQUIPMENT</u> –stair masters, rowers, elliptical, etc. Again, no place to store it. Please try the outlets mentioned above.

<u>LARGE YARD EQUIPMENT</u> –Mowers, blowers, heavy-duty tools and equipment, etc. Again, no place to store it. Please try the outlets mentioned above.

BABY CAR SEATS AND BIKE HELMETS— Laws prohibit us from re-selling these (sorry)

We will accept items between 7 pm and 9 pm on Wednesdays (starting on July 21) and on Sundays between 8 am and 11 am (starting on Sunday, July 25).

And of course, we need volunteers! Volunteers to sort items throughout the summer (one night or any number of nights you can commit), and volunteers to sell items on the day of the Flea Market (Saturday, September 11, rain date of Saturday, September 18). No training, skills or resume necessary at all. We'll be using the Undercroft for all departments except clothing and accessories (those will still be in the upstairs of the Parish House). If you have kids who need community service hours, this is a great option.

Note: If you do not feel comfortable working this summer and want to contribute to the Flea Market (and to St. B's), you have other options:


- We will have items that need to be cleaned and/or polished prior to the Flea Market; please feel free to offer to do this; you can do it at home on your own time; we'll supply the goods!
