Giving Thanks

I write from my home office in Vermont, looking at green hills dotted with yellow, orange, and red trees, a light mist obscuring the full impact of this fall season. From this perch, I prepare and deliver lectures for a couple of graduate courses at Hood College, communicate through email and attend some meetings through Zoom.

When Fran and I bought this house, the plan was to spend our summers here and reside in Maryland during the academic year until it was "time to retire." But the day after our purchase of the house, the COVID shut down changed everything. Church and the college went to Zoom, and the relational solidarity we so need in our lives demanded finding new creative ways to be "together." Estimates made early in the pandemic proved incorrect as months turned to years and seasons came and went. In response, our plans changed. Living in two places was not as attractive as we imagined. So, in January 2021, we sold our Frederick home and moved the rest of the furniture to Vermont. Hood administrators decided all faculty had to return in person for the 2021-2022 academic year, which led to my decision to officially retire from the faculty after 45 years of teaching. For the second time, (first as a priest mandated by the age -rule, and second from the faculty spawned by financial pressures at Hood due to lost revenue during shut-down) I have "retired." The things I love most about Vermont include environmental policies, social solidarity (often typical of rural areas), four full seasons, and proximity to some special people who have acreage in my heart.

My daughter and grandsons remain in Maryland or southern Pennsylvania, so it is likely I will be physically present at some future date. I cannot "leave" St. B's entirely because you are part of my journey. I do give thanks to God for the solidarity of community spirit the parish embodies, and the social justice addressed and advocated by the parish. It has been a privilege to serve with Florence and Thelma who supported and shaped my years as a parish priest. I am grateful for the years of worship with you, the laughter and tears, the journey of faith in mutual ministry. You have a place in my heart and always will.

The Labyrinth in Autumn

When Maggie wrote to alert me to another Apostle poem deadline, I replied, "Already?! Time flies!" It does indeed, even as days shorten and nights lengthen in seasonal balance, still providing us with generous, never-changing 24 hours to fill as we will. We can "slow" [our perceptions of] time in numerous ways with spiritual practice: from how we choose to prepare and ingest our food to opting for a big, meaty book at bedtime rather than an eye-spinning television program; or taking ambling walks in nature rather than runs on the treadmill. A labyrinth is a remarkable journey of exploration to be experienced slowly (no shortcuts!): along its inward and outward path "comes stillness, a falling away/of running through the day.../until the center...settles..." This poem on the cusp of a faith forum on labyrinths (November 7) and at the edge of the season of Advent (November 29) invites us to breathe in slowness with a few simple steps. Enter in!

Children's Word

hildren's Word is back at St. B's! Our Kangaroos (preschool-2nd grade) and Elephants (grades 3-5) now meet for ~30-40 minutes each week in the Undercroft and via Zoom, between the reading of the Epistle and the passing of the Peace, to learn the lessons adolescent and adult parishioners are learning from the Gospel and sermons. They are also learning more about the Church and how and why we worship the way we do, thanks to Reverend Thelma, who has created a wonderful new series of 3-4-minute videos called "We are the Church" that each week teach about a different aspect of our church and/or worship service.

For their opening meeting, the Kangaroos and Elephants met in a combined-class, hybrid welcoming session on October 3 that introduced them to each other and to their new teachers, Kobey DeVale and Steve Miller, and volunteer helpers Kathie Clark, Lex DeVale, and Mark DeVale, in addition to Children's Word Tech Verger John DeVale.

We first learned from Kobey's "Who Are You" video

the many different ways that Jesus has been depicted in art through the years, demonstrating that we all don't see Jesus (or anyone for that matter!) in the same way. Then to help us all get to know each other better, we each made and shared a "who am I" craft piece containing a non-glass mirror and decorated with things we like and that say something about who we are. Thanks to "fun box" deliveries that include

everything that is needed for class (see the photo for an example), all students can participate, whether they are attending virtually or in person.

In subsequent weeks, the Kangaroos and Elephants have met for a gathering session during the first 10-15 minutes of class before splitting off into their two agegroup classes. These gathering sessions begin with opening prayer, then a "We are the Church" video and discussion of the church topic highlighted by that video, sometimes together with an activity related to that topic. Reverend Thelma's first videos have about the altar and the various things that might be found there. You will be delighted to know that even BEFORE they saw the first video, our Kangaroos and Elephants were able to name almost everything that appears on the altar during our services (can you?). They learned that the altar is just like a table that we set with place mats, food, and drink, and to reinforce this idea, Kobey led them in making place mats annotated with things that are important in their lives.



In their separate classes, our Kangaroos and Elephants have been reading age-level versions of our Gospel lessons, including the story of the rich man who asked Jesus how to get to heaven, and the story of how James and John asked Jesus to have special places next to him in heaven. They explored these stories with activities like building clay camels and trying to fit them through the hole of a

plastic needle (not so easy...), and by talking about generosity and priorities. The Kangaroo and Elephant students have all been great! The biggest challenge has been squeezing everything we want to do within the brief time we all have together.

All children age 3-10 (preschool-grade 5) are welcome and encouraged to join us, as are any and all parishioners who would just like to sit in or help out.


The Cribbery

Creation Caretakers' Continuing Series about Trash: About Recycling Household Batteries

Two good reasons not to throw batteries into household trash:

- Some types of batteries contain hazardous materials (mercury, lithium, and other scarce metals).
- Useful materials can be reclaimed from any battery and new products manufactured from them.

Disposal of Rechargeable Batteries is Regulated

You probably know that you cannot throw used rechargeable batteries from electronic devices or power tools into the trash:

By federal and state law, used nickel cadmium (Ni-Cd) batteries, used small-sealed lead-acid (SSLA) batteries, and rechargeable batteries from phones, laptops, cameras, and power tools must be recycled because they contain hazardous materials. (Damaged lithium-type batteries may even cause fires). Merchants who sell devices containing these types of batteries are required to recycle used batteries for free. Baltimore City and Baltimore County will not accept them in either household trash or single-stream recycling, but they do accept them at City of Baltimore's Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program Drop off Centers and at Baltimore County's three drop-off facilities.

Button cell or coin batteries, used in high-end watches, hearing aids, and remote key fobs for vehicles may contain small amounts of silver, mercury, cadmium, and lithium. Jewelers, doctor's offices, and car dealerships almost always recycle them for you when you get them repaired.

Nevertheless, you may still find yourself with a used one you don't want to keep...

Single Use Batteries Are Disposable

According to Call2Recycle, "there is currently no national stewardship solution to allow for free recycling of single-use batteries, except in Vermont." Since 1996, hazardous materials (such as lead) have been phased out of their manufacture. Both Baltimore County and Baltimore City accept household single-use alkaline batteries in household trash (not recycling bins). Such batteries (9-volt, AA, AAA, C, D, etc.) power all kinds of devices around the house, such as toys, TV remotes, clocks, and smoke detectors. Consumers use a lot of them. Caution: because even used batteries carry a faint charge, tape the terminals in a 9-volt battery before throwing them into the trash.

So otherwise, into the trash, out of sight and out of mind, right? Not so fast!!

Reclaiming Useful Materials

There are useful materials in all batteries! According to Call2Recycle, batteries can be used to manufacture flatware, pots and pans, and even new batteries. Scarce metals (such as lithium) and steel can be reclaimed from batteries, even single-use alkaline batteries. As consumers, doesn't it make sense for us to recycle and reuse scarce resources?

Creation Caretakers have done a little research about how consumers can recycle batteries. You can mail them (and many other types of used household things) through the post to recyclers, but it's expensive. (As for me, the cost is prohibitive). Another way is to tote used articles to local merchants that will accept them. For electronics and their rechargeable-type batteries, several local merchants accept used ones for recycling (Home Depot, Best Buy, Lowe's, ACE Hardware, and Office Max come to mind). However, these outlets do not accept single-use batteries for recycling.

Loophole for Trashing Single-Use Batteries

Creation Caretakers has discovered two merchants who will accept limited quantities (50 at a time?) of single-use alkaline batteries for free: MOM's Organic Market and Batteries Plus Bulbs. In bulk quantities, Batteries Plus Bulbs would charge \$1.50 per pound. Even our government trash collectors will not recycle single-use batteries, but these merchants will do small quantities for free. They both operate at multiple locations throughout our area.

My Dream for the Near Future

That when St. B's parishioners drop off their used batteries at church, volunteers deposit collections of them in local recycle bins available at MOM's Organic Market, Batteries Plus Bulbs, or some other local collector.

"Bmore2gether" with KIVA

IVA is a nonprofit organization that allows people to lend money to low income entrepreneurs in 77 countries. The mission is to expand financial access to help underserved communities thrive.

St. Bartholomew's has loaned through KIVA since 2015. A percentage of the operating budget is set aside for KIVA loans. Our team's name is Bmore2gether. We loan because we want to help our global neighbors start, sustain, or expand a community-based business to alleviate poverty, especially among children and youth.

Over the past six years St. B's has deposited \$24,986 into our KIVA account. When the loans are repaid, we reloan the funds. We have made 225 loans totaling \$73,675!

Recently we loaned \$1,075 to Alaa, a 36-year-old Palestinean woman who owns a small kindergarten. Alaa borrowed \$4,000 from KIVA to purchase supplies and improve the kindergarten.

Abrao is a 31-year-old strawberry farmer from Mozambique. We funded \$1,075 of his \$4,725 loan. The loan will help him expand his production area.

Maria is a member of the Getzmani Group in Guatemala. She is 32 years old and has a husband and 3 children. She requested a loan of \$3,700 to invest in her convenience store and her embroidery business. We loaned her \$1,650.

They verify individuals' eligibility for bus tokens, help with BGE turn-off notices, evictions, or prescriptions. Cheryl Murdock works as an Intake worker on Wednesdays and has been with 40 West for many years. Now substitute coverage is more likely possible all three days we are open.

Lynn Murphy is our Monday sub for food or the lobby position. Sandy Woodcock, a former 40 West director, volunteers on Mondays and can do any type of work necessary, Intake included.

Pantry on the Go takes 20 or more volunteers to distribute the food successfully.

During the summer months the Maryland Food Bank provides 10-12 volunteers per event. Our local volunteers include Carol Bailey, Annie Chairs, TJ Cox, Patrick and Peggy Cummings, Peggy Dorsey, Barbara Knauf, Sally Krach, Susan Lundin, Anne Marie MacInnes, Amelia Davis Pearson, and Glorius Sullivan, to name a few.
