Psalm 84 begins with these words: "How lovely is your dwelling place, O Lord of hosts! My soul longs, indeed it faints for the courts of the Lord; my heart and my flesh sing for joy to the living God." The writer of this psalm is singing a truth that we all experience: it is so good for our souls to be inside "the dwelling place" of the Lord. The "courts" in Psalm 84 are the various Temple courtyards where people gathered as they prepared to worship.

In ancient Israel, God dwelt -- or chose to be present -- in the Holy of Holies, which was the most sacred space in the Temple. God's glory lived in the Temple, and the holiness of God was a fearful and wonderful presence that surrounded the people in worship. The Temple was a place of awe, wonder, and praise.

As much as the Temple is the "home" for God's people, it also serves as a place of welcome and protection for other creatures, like the birds who make their nest in the nooks and crannies of the Temple stones. I can imagine the psalmist watching the swallows dart in and out, circling in the air above the Temple before returning to their nests. The birds don't know their Creator, yet they fly and eat and nest as they were created to do. They are fulfilling their God-given instincts.

One of our God-given instincts is to worship, and this Psalm speaks to the desire to be in the presence of God in the sacred space that is the Temple. In fact, the Psalmist is clear in his priorities. If one could choose between large, ornate "tents," meaning wealth and status gained by wicked means, or being a lowly, humble servant in the Temple – then the choice is clear: "I would rather be a doorkeeper in the house of my God than live in the tents of wickedness" (v. 10).

Our church membership is filled with people who own the same sentiments of love and appreciation for our church: both our physical structures and our spiritual home. This spring sees people coming back to GPC for the first time in a long time – for some a full year. I have heard so many people describe the emotion that has overwhelmed them with just walking into the building. Even though we are worshipping in the Activities Center, there is a genuine mixture of joy, relief, and gratitude when people sit down for worship at GPC for the first time in a year. ...And then they see the people and the tears begin to well up.

I have learned throughout the last year just how much people love both the physical and spiritual home that our church and congregation are, and we appreciate it even more now because of the sense that it was "taken away" by the pandemic.

Now, however, we are returning, slowly but surely, and we are beginning to engage with one another again in the life



of our church. The danger to our health system is subsiding, more people are being vaccinated, and we are able to open up more and more to regular church life. We have increased our seating capacity from 50 to 70 (and in our make-shift, AC-Sanctuary, that's comfortably full), with more seats for visitors and extended family. We are open for meetings and groups to resume, as long as groups don't mind sharing limited space due to the flood. We are happy for people to come into the church building for gatherings, prayer meetings, and Bible studies, even if we're still bound by a few pandemic-protocols. Our church leadership will soon contemplate when to return to our usual morning schedule of two worship services with Sunday School and fellowship in between.

Finally, I want to offer a word of gratitude for our Presbyterian decision-making process. Instead of a Superintendent or Bishop making top-down decisions for our congregation, we rely on our local leadership of Deacons and Elders to discern God's will and what is best for our congregation. Never in my ministry have I seen this Spirit-inspired process more important than during this pandemic, mainly because our leadership represents the spectrum of belief and approach toward responding to the pandemic. We have church officers with a wide array of viewpoints, from very cautious to very open, and we have tried to navigate the right course for the church. We rely on those with close knowledge of infectious diseases, how they spread, and the harm they might inflict.

Our leadership reflects our congregation, and our leaders have not always agreed with one another or with the decisions and direction of the majority. In the same way, some church members have not agreed with the leadership's decisions during the pandemic, either because they perceive we are being far too restrictive or far too loose. We have received emotional feedback from both perspectives, for which I am grateful because those opinions reveal the underlying truth of how much people love their church and fellow members.

As we continue to emerge from the pandemic, we know these words from Psalm 84 ring true: "For a day in your courts is better than a thousand elsewhere."

At that time she had no idea! Keep her husband Woodie and 9th grade son Johnathan in your prayers.

I began here at GPC as Director of Music in November of 1993. I met Sandy as a Doctoral Student at The University of Mississippi in 1995 - my wife Dr. Jan Petri, myself, and our Speech Pathologist Dr. Bill Hinkle were adjunct Professors. Dr. Hinkle and I served on Sandy's Doctoral Committee in 1996; her doctorate was in Vocal Pedagogy. She asked to do a doctoral project in our medical office (Jan H. Petri, M.D. & Voice Care Associates). I told her that we would do the project with her if she would sing with me in our choir at GPC. She agreed and that led to her joining us at GPC as soloist/section leader and Music Administrative Assistant.

About 12 years ago she became our Coordinator of Children's Choirs which included VBS week as she taught the children songs throughout the week. In fact, many of you are probably more used to seeing her from the back, like the picture at the top, as she directed GPC's children's choirs for very special events.

Sandy has a long history of distinguished service at GPC she was loved by all as a soloist. She had the ability to sing all styles of music with equal beauty and clarity. The congregation loved to hear her sing spirituals a capella especially at Christmas Eve services when she'd sing Sweet Little Jesus Boy and always that meaningful, worshipful moment when she'd sing Away in a Manger from the balcony. Sandy will be deeply missed but never forgotten.

May at GPC will see our Children involved in worship on May 9, Mother's Day; we will end the month with Pentecost and Trinity Sunday. Even with the restrictions of COVID we strive to bring quality music to worship each Sunday. As I always do let me thank those of you who make special contributions to music through our Music Fund and the Teachey Scholarship Fund. We give GOD the GLORY for all that we accomplish through music at GPC!!

Rising Together Roundation (RTF) promotes high academic, leadership, and character standards and broadens peer relationships among students throughout the greater community. Designed to foster academic preparedness for a group of emerging academic and social leaders, the programs and events develop and connect future leaders of our community.

Challenge 1:

Summer and After-School Programming

Students from under-resourced communities struggle to access high-quality summer and after-school programming. These students face socio-economic challenges that have brought them to this critical point in their educational development, but they are all eager to learn and thrive.

Challenge 2:

Educational Inequality

The need for educational transformation in the U.S. is real and urgent. Right now children from under-resourced communities are performing significantly below grade level.

With third-grade reading serving as a powerful predictor of lifelong success, this educational inequity is holding back generations of children from reaching their full potential. This community crisis will affect lifelong success and the economy.

Educational inequality is the greatest social justice and civil rights issue in the U.S. today. With about 200 schools and 7,000 teachers, Shelby County Schools* is among the 25 largest districts in the U.S. Of the approximately 106,000 students in the district, 80% are economically disadvantaged by free and reduced lunch standards.

Challenge 3:

Community Impact

Technology is a driving force of our economy. Well-paying els of STEM skills. Yet stud-



ies show the U.S. lagging behind other developed countries in creating the workforce of the future, ranking 38th out of 71 countries in math and 24th in science.

Rising Together is dedicated to serving and supporting elementary, middle, and high school students by creating, administering, and supporting excellent academic, leadership, and social programs and events and to providing necessary financial assistance so that disadvantaged students from under-served communities may participate. These programs and events are a collaborative effort by individuals representing public and independent primary and secondary schools, universities and colleges, and other organizations dedicated to excellence in education and leadership.

Thomas enjoys all genres of music and has a keen ear for a variety of tunes. He is adept at playing guitar, piano, xylophone, and other percussion instruments. Whatever instrument he chooses to use, Thomas learns quickly with a natural ear for notes! In AMPlify, Thomas has experienced semi-private lessons with guitar, and group instruction including use of the piano, and many kinds of percussion and hand instruments. Alongside his joy for playing music, Thomas's interests include learning about classical composers. His parents shared that Thomas also enjoys riding in the car listening to movie soundtracks.

Thomas lives locally, with his parents, Dale and John Guererri. He has one older brother – his big brother and best friend forever – John Darwin Guererri. Both of his grandmothers live nearby, too. Though he was born here, in the music city of Memphis, Tennessee, Thomas lived in Barton, Mississippi, until age five. Despite his diagnoses of Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) and Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD), Thomas's parents have always focused on his abilities rather than his disabilities. They are rightfully proud of the tremendous progress Thomas has made over the years, recognizing it is by God's grace and with the support of a strong team of people working with Thomas.

Thomas began receiving private speech and occupational therapy at 2 ½ years of age. As more outlets were accessible for services through the public school system, Thomas engaged in both venues for therapeutic services. The one-to-one sessions as well as the group sessions took Thomas's skills in a positive direction. His services continued through high school and included a full-time aide during school hours. His work was modified, as decided, and implemented, by his IEP team members. These services afforded Thomas the opportunity and privilege to receive a regular high school diploma. Additionally, while attending White Station High School, Thomas completed the Junior ROTC program and was inducted into the Science National Honor Society! He received further recognition for excellence from the Honors Physics class teacher who requested Thomas attend her class! Thomas graduated from White Station High School in 2017.

During his high school years, Thomas participated in events like Special Olympics and Autism Speaks walks. He was also a participant in the Best Buddies program. These are remarkable accomplishments, considering Thomas initially struggled within social settings. His parents reported that he was nine years old before he was comfortable going to restaurants. The strong odors and large crowds presented challenges to Thomas. Another interesting obstacle overcome – Thomas is now equipped to enjoy

people singing "Happy Birthday" on April 14; for many birthdays, his family had to sing "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow" instead. It is inspiring to know Thomas has overcome several trials in his twenty-three years!

On Thursday mornings, Thomas participates in Germantown Presbyterian Church's Orff-based AMPlify music program, and we feel mightily blessed to work with him and enjoy his talents! He initially participated in our summer Wacky Wednesday program activities. He is witty and engages easily in conversations around his preferences and interests, such as animals. In his younger years, Thomas wanted a platypus as a pet; however, he and his brother, John Darwin, accepted an alternative and had a fish named JoJo. Thomas has learned about many animals and willingly shares his knowledge of animals' habitats and food-chain rankings. Thomas also enjoys painting and coloring, as well as being an active person. Thomas enjoys outdoor activities, such as walks with his mom, swimming, and going to the zoo.

Through the love and nurturing of a dedicated Christian family, Thomas has accomplished so much! God has blessed Thomas with a wide array of talents and interests, and we admire how he and his family give God the glory for all the talent he shares. Thomas is respectful, kind, funny, and serves as a good role model to others who may struggle with similar abilities and challenges. We pray that Thomas will be a part of our music program for many years to come. SESSION CORNER

Highlights from our 4/15th Session meeting include:

- 1. GPC Intern, Kirsten King, presented update on GPC's Strategic Visioning Process currently underway to update church Strategic Goals. As her seminary project, she agreed to facilitate this on-going process for our Strategic Visioning Committee (SVC). Further updates will be provided as we continue.
- > Note: The SVC was formed by Session Fall 2019 when GPC leaders recognized need to reflect and update our church's Strategic Vision for Ministry that was adopted by Session Fall 2015. The SVC was formed to help guide church leadership in reviewing the 2015 Strategic Vision for Ministry. This culminated in a joint Session & Diaconate Retreat held Feb 2020. Session and Diaconate committees provided further more narrowly focused input in follow-up to this retreat. The pandemic then halted our process. In Dec 2020, Kirsten helped our SVC focus to re-start. We are grateful for Kirsten's expert facilitation to help the SVC and GPC leaders complete this important process for our church.
- 2. Session approved Worship Committee recommendation to increase sign-up capacity from 50 to 70 people for both worship services held in the Activity Center. This includes capacity in this area for weddings and funerals. Members are encouraged to attend the 6pm evening service where there is currently more availability for sign-up.

- > Education:
- 1) Memphis JOY PROMADE 4/16th! Grateful for generous donations that allowed us to meet goals. Decorations look great!
- 2) Adult Ed: Beginning to think about Fall. Pleased to have Mike Lyle on committee now.
- 3) Children: VBS scheduled M-F week of June 7th from 9am-12pm. Sign up your children today, and help volunteer! (Vols willing to fill any last-minute gaps that will be needed that wk would be especially appreciated.)

- 4) Youth: 4/11th Auction was a success! Approximately 70 families represented. Still finalizing auction results, yet appears up to \$14k raised. Thank you! Plans for summer include: Sr High trip to Montreat and Jr High trip to Great Escape. Continuing effort to boost youth involvement by reaching out to meet families where they are. Christopher Greco doing a super job.
- > Missions: Invited "Room In The Inn" leadership team to April meeting to help brainstorm on how to move ministry forward after Susan Hurt steps down. "Rising Together" has summer program plans. "Binghampton Christian Academy" vols remain at work. New MAM CEO to speak during Moment for Missions.

MAY IS MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS MONTH

Being aware of our own, as well as others', mental health is always vital to our sense of wholeness – body, mind, and soul, for these aspects of being human are as connected to each other as our bones are connected one to the other, and the function of our organs rely on the function of other organs. Our heads, hearts, and physical bodies rely on one another for spiritual, physical, and emotional health.



• Acknowledging out loud that mental illness is a brain disorder that needs to be attended to by mental health professionals.

• Talk about our own struggles.

• Help to educate others, for education leads to understanding, understanding leads to empathy, empathy leads to compassionate care.

When I, as a pastor and also a mental health professional work with individuals, couples, and families, I help them to see this connection and also to strive to improve the connection in their daily lives for the benefit of their relationships with themselves, one another, and with God.

As we enter into the month of May, then, we have a wonderful opportunity to explore our own mental health and its importance in our lives because May is designated as MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS MONTH!

What, then, is Mental Health? Let's begin with the opposite - What is Mental Illness?

<u>Mental Illness</u> - is a brain disorder that covers a wide range of maladies in our brains:

- Depression overwhelming sadness that doesn't go away
- Anxiety when worries and fear affect our ability to function day-to-day
- Compulsive behaviors when our anxieties manifest in behaviors that we feel as though we must repeat over and over again
- Bipolar when mood swings (very high highs and very low lows) are pervasive and persistent
- Psychosis when we feel as though our brain is playing tricks on us – seeing, hearing, or believing things that don't seem real or quite right
- Eating Disorders when our physical health and overall well-being is affected by the way we eat or don't eat
- Post-Traumatic Stress when we are continually bothered by a previous traumatic life event
- Addiction when alcohol or controlled substance use takes over our lives

In our culture and society, there seems to be a stigma around Mental Illness. So, how can we help dismantle this stigma? What about how our own community of faith responds to mental illness? At GPC, we are well connected with organizations that help individuals, couples, and families who want and need to seek help:

- NAMI the National Alliance on Mental Illness provides support groups and free classes to those whose family members suffer from mental illnesses.
- > During the pandemic, NAMI is meeting virtually on the 1st and 3rd Tuesday evenings. If you would like to know more please contact Pastor Susie: care@german-townpres.org
- > Following the pandemic, NAMI will resume their inperson group meetings at GPC on Tuesday evenings. All are welcome.
- COUNSELING: Samaritan Counseling also has offices here at GPC and their professional counselors provide help for those who need it. During the pandemic, Samaritan counselors are providing Telehealth counseling sessions. Soon, however, they will return to in-person counseling. For information and appointments, call 901-729-3900.

Samaritan Counseling believes that financial limitations should not preclude any person from receiving needed care so fees for their services are based on circumstances of the individual, income, and family size. Samaritan Counseling's ability to provide these services is made possible thanks to the contributions from community partners, our generous individual donors, and our active community fundraising activities throughout the year.

Now, about Mental Health ...

Who can benefit from practicing Mental Health guidelines? EVERYONE!

Here are some ways to benefit:

- Keep and/or create a rhythm to your day -
- > Start your day with positivity and possibility:
- * wake up with the sun, make your bed, get dressed;
- * eat healthy foods; try new recipes;
- * be creative try new activities or return to old ones that you used to enjoy when you had the time.
- · Connect -
- > with God -
- * pray at least once daily (more is even better);
- * find GPC's Daily Devotions on the GPC Facebook page, and GPC's Worship services and Sunday school classes on the GPC website, on YouTube, and on Facebook;
- * read your Bible God's Word will bring you comfort try reading the Psalms, for example.
 - "The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? The Lord is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?" (Psalm 27:1)
- > with Family and Friends learn to video-chat and/or call each other:
- > with Nature go outside fresh air is good for what ails us!
- <u>Unplug</u> set a time of day when you will unplug from your devices.

- Only read/see the facts on the pandemic: U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention: https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/index.html or the World Health Organization: https://www.who.int/emergencies/diseases/novel-coronavirus-2019. Don't get misled with false information.
- Reach out find mental health resources (see above lists) whenever you are in need of talking to someone.
- Serve God by serving others.
- Be gentle with yourself:
- > Breathe deeply, exhaling anxiety and inhaling the breath of the Holy Spirit of God. Repeat over and over again until you begin to feel more calm.
- > Know that your reactions of anxiety are normal we are all feeling them; there is no shame in feeling anxious. Just learn how to manage your anxiety in healthy ways. Listen to "Coronavirus Anxiety (Part 1)" podcast: https://www.apa.org/research/action/speaking-of-psychology/coronavirus-anxiety
- * Unhealthy ways include excessive drinking and eating, and taking your feelings out on others through sarcasm, belittling, defensiveness, contempt, and stonewalling.
- > If you have difficulty sleeping, try one of the apps that help to take your mind off of whatever is keeping you awake. I like the bedtime stories about nature that are on the app *Calm*.

VBS Volunteer Opportunities

Vacation Bible School June 7-11, 2021 WELCOME BACK VOLUNTEERS!

If you ask any of our confirmands what has been their favorite church experience, they will most likely answer...VBS! We are so excited to welcome children back into the church this year for a fun week to learn about Jesus Christ! We will take a closer look at the Bible as we learn to FOCUS on Jesus!

We cannot have a safe and successful VBS without our dedicated volunteers! Please review the positions in which we are in need. You may sign up to volunteer by going to www.germantownpres.org/vbs or email Anna at annaw@germantownpres.org.

SHEPHERD – The Shepherd leads a group of 5 or 6 children around the church to each rotation. At each rotation a lead teacher will meet you there to lead the designated activity. Your job is simply to know the children in your group, lead them to each rotation, and be hands-on as they need encouragement and help. You will have a youth mentor assigned to your group, and he/she will be reliable help! You may sign up to be a Shepherd as your schedule allows...all 5 days or even 1 day a week. We understand Shepherds need some flexibility during their week, and we aim to make it work! Arrival time is 8:30am for the morning meeting. Head home after all of your children are picked up by a parent – 12:15pm. Approximately 10 shepherds needed each day!

ELEMENTARY or PRESCHOOL CLASSROOM TEACHER – Calling all teachers! We need people who can deliver a clear message with interactive fun for the children. The elementary classroom teacher's role is to teach the Bible story of the day. A daily video is included in this time frame. Activities and supplies will be ready and prepared for you. You will receive a notebook so that you can study over the lesson, but activities and supplies will be ready and prepped! Arrive to GPC and head straight to your classroom at 9:00. Your first class will arrive at 9:15 with a Shepherd and youth mentor to help in the classroom. We need 4 classroom teachers! It is most helpful in this position if you can be present to teach all week, Monday through Friday.


